The Liturgy of the Word

The New Testament Reading: Acts 9. 1 - 22

Reader A reading from the Acts of the Apostles.

Meanwhile Saul, still breathing threats and murder against the disciples of the Lord, went to the high priest and asked him for letters to the synagogues at Damascus, so that if he found any who belonged to the Way, men or women, he might bring them bound to Jerusalem. Now as he was going along and approaching Damascus, suddenly a light from heaven flashed around him. He fell to the ground and heard a voice saying to him, 'Saul, Saul, why do you persecute me?' He asked, 'Who are you, Lord?' The reply came, 'I am Jesus, whom you are persecuting. But get up and enter the city, and you will be told what you are to do.' The men who were travelling with him stood speechless because they heard the voice but saw no one. Saul got up from the ground, and though his eyes were open, he could see nothing; so they led him by the hand and brought him into Damascus. For three days he was without sight, and neither ate nor drank.

Now there was a disciple in Damascus named Ananias. The Lord said to him in a vision, 'Ananias.' He answered, 'Here I am, Lord.' The Lord said to him, 'Get up and go to the street called Straight, and at the house of Judas look for a man of Tarsus named Saul. At this moment he is praying, and he has seen in a vision a man named Ananias come in and lay his hands on him so that he might regain his sight.' But Ananias answered, 'Lord, I have heard from many about this man, how much evil he has done to your saints in Jerusalem; and here he has authority from the chief priests to bind all who invoke your name.' But

the Lord said to him, 'Go, for he is an instrument whom I have chosen to bring my name before Gentiles and kings and before the people of Israel; I myself will show him how much he must suffer for the sake of my name.' So Ananias went and entered the house. He laid his hands on Saul and said, 'Brother Saul, the Lord Jesus, who appeared to you on your way here, has sent me so that you may regain your sight and be filled with the Holy Spirit.' And immediately something like scales fell from his eyes, and his sight was restored. Then he got up and was baptized, and after taking some food, he regained his strength.

For several days he was with the disciples in Damascus, and immediately he began to proclaim Jesus in the synagogues, saying, 'He is the Son of God.' All who heard him were amazed and said, 'Is not this the man who made havoc in Jerusalem among those who invoked this name? And has he not come here for the purpose of bringing them bound before the chief priests?' Saul became increasingly more powerful and confounded the Jews who lived in Damascus by proving that Jesus was the Messiah.

Reader All Let us wait upon the Lord; in whose word is our hope.

We welcome all Christians, including baptized children of any age, to receive Holy Communion at Sheffield Cathedral. Gluten free wafers are available, please ask the priest as you approach to receive Holy Communion. The common cup is now being administered to those who wish to receive from it.

It is strongly advised that communicants do not dip their wafers into the cup in order to receive from it (the method known as intinction). The possibility of spreading infection is much greater if this method is used.

If you do not wish to receive Holy Communion, you are invited to come forward for a blessing. If you wish to receive a blessing, please bring this booklet with you and hold it so that it can be clearly seen by the ministers.

Evening Eucharist, Sunday 28 January, 18.00, in the nave. In our next Evening Eucharist, we will be responding in worship to the magnificent 'Threads through Creation' exhibition in the cathedral. Inspired by the creation story of Genesis, the 12 panels (1.5m/8ft high by as much as 4m/13ft wide) have been crafted using layers of silk, hand-dyed materials, metallic leathers and gold leaf, miles of thread – and more than eight million stitches! Likewise, this service will blend liturgy from around the world with contemporary sacred music in an intimate candlelit atmosphere. Join us for an act of worship that is at once earthy, holy, and inclusive. Everyone is more than welcome - and welcome to bring friends.

A Healing and Wholeness Service will be held in the Cathedral Crypt on Saturday 3 February at 15.30 and will be a reflective quiet space with the opportunity to receive prayer and/or anointing for healing if you wish.

Young Adults' Group. Our Young Adults group is designed to connect, equip, and encourage those between the ages of 18-30.

The group meets twice a month: once for Bible study and once for an informal social gathering. Meetings are on Sunday evenings from 17.30 to 18.45, following on from Evensong in the Cathedral. The next session is on Sunday 4 February. All are welcome to all sessions, whether you've ever been to the Cathedral before or not. There is no preparation or prior knowledge required for the Bible study; please join the group at any time if you're interested to learn more about the Bible and the Christian faith. Lent 2024

Ash Wednesday

Lent begins with Ash Wednesday (14 February). Our main service will be at 19.30 and will include the imposition of ashes. Ashing will also form part of the 12.30 Eucharist that day.

Confirmation and Baptism groups will begin on 4 February at 12 noon on Sundays until Easter. These are for anyone new or returning to church and interested in learning about the Christian faith. Please contact the Cathedral office or see Canon Justin Dodd or Revds Richard or Ann Walton.

Silent Prayer Lent is a time for stripping things back to the bare essentials in order to focus more fully on God. Silence is a spiritual discipline that has long been used for this purpose, and thus a feature of Lent. For Lent 2024, Rev Dr Casey Strine will be leading a time of silent prayer on the Fridays after Ash Wednesday (starting 16 Feb) until Holy Week, allowing you to engage in a discipline of abstention and to draw nearer to God.

These times of silence will follow the outline of the Stations of the Cross in Common Worship. Starting at 12.00 noon and lasting until 12.25 in the Chapel of the Holy Spirit, each one will be followed by the usual midday Eucharist, to which all are welcome. Feel free to attend any sessions you can make.

Questioning God - Transformative conversations from the Bible. Throughout the Bible, many of the conversations between God and humanity revolve around questions. God both asks and is asked. This 4-session course will reflect on some of those conversations, inviting us to consider how they invite us to explore and deepen our own faith. Led by The Revd Captain Ian Maher CA (Minor Canon) the first session is on Thursday 22 February, 13.30 - 14.30 in the Town Trust Room, and continuing on Thursdays 29 February, 7 and 14 March. 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


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Threads through Creation Friday 19 January - Saturday 2 March 2024



Threads through Creation is a spectacular sequence of twelve huge textile panels. It's an exuberant retelling of the creation story in the book of Genesis, a retelling which many visitors will find both moving and breath-taking. Viewers are treated to a wonderful variety of colours, shapes, patterns – and of course lots of creatures!

The exhibition is one of the largest textile projects by a single artist, ever. It has taken Jacqui nearly three years. It follows on from 'Threads through Revelation', her first huge exhibition which visited 14 cathedrals from 2016 to 2018 and was seen by more than 500,000 visitors.

Threads through Creation is touring cathedrals throughout 2023 and 2024. If your school or community group would like to visit there is a free teacher PDF guide on our website (www.sheffieldcathedral.org) and our guides will be on hand to give walking tours throughout the exhibition. There will also be craft activities to engage little ones in their learning about God's creations.

For those who would like to reflect on the biblical, theological, and artistic content of the panels with some guidance, our Minor Canon Theologian Casey Strine will be leading 'theological tours' of Threads through Creation. The remainin tours will happen on:

Friday 9 February, 10.30 to 11.30 Tuesday 20 February, 18.30 to 19.30 (after Evensong)

These are free, and you need not sign up. Consider bringing along a friend or colleague who does not normally attend the Cathedral (or church at all) but might enjoy this sort of intellectual and artistic discussion.
